100 Years of Excellence in Educator Preparation

The preparation of educators for public schools in a democratic society has been central to the mission of Kent State University since its establishment as the “Northeastern Normal School” in 1910. For 100 years, the College has prepared educators and researchers in for work throughout Ohio and the world. Our programs are recognized for scholarship that impacts theory and practice and educating professionals to be knowledgeable, empathic, and creative members of any education setting.

The educator preparation unit is accredited by the National Council for Accreditation of Teacher Education (NCATE). KSU is 4th in Ohio in the number of teachers it prepares and 1st in NE Ohio. Graduates find employment in all 50 states and abroad.

Highlights of College Initiatives

International scholars and students visit and study in EHHS each year and our faculty and students engage in exchanges, internships, and visiting lecture and research programs world wide. More than 50% of the teacher education faculty have been active in international projects.

The AT&T Classroom is the only K-12 technology driven classroom located at a university where intact classes of K-12 students and their teachers attend school ½ day, every day for 6 weeks at a time.

The Research Center for Educational Technology has been awarded over \$10 million in the past eleven years to study the integration of technology into teaching.

EHHS has exclusive rights to award graduate credit for the International Baccalaureate Organization professional development seminars worldwide.

EHHS was ranked among the top ten colleges in the country, Fall 2007, on a measure termed the **Faculty Scholarly Productivity Index** as reported by the *Chronicle of Higher Education*.

EHHS graduates the highest number of secondary mathematics teachers in Ohio.

More than \$4 million dollars in grants are awarded annually in STEM and special education areas.

The Counseling doctoral program ranks among the best in the country. In 2007 it was rated number one on the Scholarly Productivity Index and in 2009 was rated one of the top 14 programs in the country by U. S. News and World Reports.

American Sign Language and Teaching English as a Second Language are the only licensure programs of their kind offered in Ohio.
